Overall Participation



Overall enrollment in study abroad programs increased by 21% from Academic Year 2016 to Academic Year 2018.





Applicants for study abroad must be in good academic and disciplinary standing.



FUNDING

In evaluations, many students expressed the need for additional funds beyond their current financial aid and scholarships to pay for an international experience. Some students likely do not explore the option due to financial concerns. Some students cannot take advantage of a full semester, cost-effective, exchange program due to work, obligations at home, and travel costs.

DIVERSITY OF STUDENTS SHOULD REFLECT UM POPULATION

UM strives for a more diverse study abroad participant population. Underrepresentation occurs by race, ethnicity, major, and gender.

STUDY ABROAD POSITIVELY IMPACTS OLE MISS STUDENTS

94% of students responding (57% response rate) said that they had matured personally, professionally, and emotionally due to study abroad. 94.3% stated that studying abroad had a lasting impact on their world view.
